
NEDERLAND INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT



Local Innovation Plan (Renewal) 2022-2027

HB 1842, of the 84th Legislative Session, allows Texas districts to qualify as a District of Innovation. Districts of Innovation are able to gain local control of certain operations that are currently under the control of the Texas Education Agency.

• NISD Board of Education adopts a resolution of intent to renew Nederland ISD District of innovation Plan.

Wednesday, June 29, 2022

• The draft version of the proposed renewal plan will be posted on the District's website. The plan must remain posted for at least 30 days prior to Board adoption.

Thursday, July 28, 2022

• District-level committee held a public meeting to consider the final version of the renewal plan. The committee approved the plan by a unanimous vote.

Monday, August 1, 2022

• NISD Board of Trustees approved the District of Innovation plan by unanimous vote.

Monday, August 8, 2022

- A copy of the local innovation plan was posted on the Nederland ISD website.
- Approved District of Innovation plan sent to the Commissioner.

INTRODUCTION

House Bill (HB) 1842 passed during the 84th Legislative System permits Texas public school districts to become Districts of Innovation and to obtain exemption from certain provisions of the Texas Education Code.

Potential benefits of becoming a District of Innovation include:

- **Flexibility**: Districts will have the flexibility to implement exemptions from certain mandates and the power to innovate and think differently.
- Local control: Districts decide which flexibilities best suit their local needs.
- **Autonomy**: Districts must submit a District of Innovation Plan to the commissioner of education, but approval is not required.

On March 20, 2017, the Nederland Independent School District passed a resolution to explore the development of a District of Innovation Plan to increase local control over District operations and to support innovation and local initiatives. The plan was adopted on Thursday, August 10, 2017 and expires August 9, 2022.

On June 20, 2022, the Nederland Independent School District's Board of Trustees passed a Resolution to notify the Commissioner of Education of the board's intent to renew the District of Innovation Plan to continue local control over District operations and to support innovation and local initiatives. The renewal of this plan seeks to increase the District's flexibility in order to improve educational outcomes for the benefit of students and the community. An 18 member District of Innovation Committee including teachers, principals, parents, community members, student and administrators met to review and discuss the draft of the renewal and revisions of the current DOI Plan.

TERM

The term of the Plan is for 5 years, beginning August 10, 2022 and ending August 9, 2027, unless terminated or amended earlier by the Board of Trustees in accordance with the law. If, within the term of this Plan, others areas of operations are to be considered for flexibility as part of HB 1842, a district will follow the process outlined in 19 TAC 102.1313.

AREAS OF INNOVATION

With regard to each area of innovation, the District declares exemption from the listed statutory provisions, as well as any implementing rules or regulations promulgated pursuant to those statutory provisions by any state agency or entity, including but not limited to the Commissioner of Education, Texas Education Agency, State Board for Educator Certification, and State Board of Education.

1. School Start and End Date

Exemption from: TEC 25.0811; TEC 25.0812

Related Board Policies: EB Legal

Manner in which statute inhibits the goals of the plan

TEC 25.0811 states that a school district may not begin student instruction before the 4th Monday of August. TEC 25.0812 states that a school district may not schedule the last day of school before May 15. The current process allows no flexibility in the design of the annual calendars to fit the needs of the community or the wishes of the local Board of Trustees who represent community interests in this matter.

Innovation Strategies

- a. Relief from that statute will allow NISD to develop a calendar that addresses student instruction and focus professional development in conjunction with the new instructional minutes requirement, rather than days.
- b. Alignment of the district calendar with local universities, advanced placement exams, and STAAR timelines.
- c. Provide for increased local control of the instructional calendar in order to be responsive to community needs.

2. Instructional Minutes/Length of Instructional Day/Early Release Days *Exemption from: TEC 25.081*

Relevant Board Policies: EB Legal, EC Legal

Manner in which statute inhibits the goals of the plan

TEC 25.081 requires that a school district provide at least 75,600 minutes of instruction each school year, including intermission and recess. School districts must seek a waiver of this requirement from TEA in order to provide fewer than the required number of instructional minutes in the case of natural disaster or calamity. This requirement restricts the District in the development of the academic calendar, including the scheduling of early release days and staff development days.

TEC 25.081 (e) references a day of instruction as 420 minutes

Innovation Strategies

- a. The district seeks relief from this section in order to provide staff development days throughout the school year. These non-instructional days have been purposefully placed throughout the calendar to allow the teachers to plan instruction based on student instructional data in addition to engaging in relevant, targeted professional development.
- b. The district seeks additional flexibility to schedule early release days in the calendar in order to provide for student and district needs.

3. Kindergarten - Grade 4 Class Size Reporting Requirement

Exemption from: TEC 25.112; TEC 25.113

Related Board Policies: EEB Legal

Manner in which statute inhibits the goals of the plan:

TEC 25.112 requires districts to maintain a class size of 22 students or less for Kindergarten through 4th Grade classes. When any class exceeds this limit, the district must complete and file a waiver with the Texas Education Agency. These waivers are never rejected by TEA and is a burdensome process for school districts.

TEC 25.113 requires school districts to notify parents of waivers or exceptions to class size limits. In many cases, the class has returned to a smaller student to teacher ratio before the waiver is even approved negating the need for this notice.

Innovation Strategies:

- a. NISD believes in a low student to teacher ratio in all of its classrooms. In the event, that any class grade K-4 exceeds the 22:1 ratio during the school year, the superintendent will report this information to the Board of Trustees. Decisions regarding appropriate student to teacher ratios will be made at the local level, taking into consideration the age and grade level of the students, the subject matter of the class, the needs of individual teachers and student groups, and the availability of additional instructional staff members. NISD fully intends to follow current class size requirements. This strategy is for reporting requirements only.
- b. The requirement to notify TEA of larger class sizes will be eliminated.
- c. Parents of students in K-4 classrooms that exceed a ratio of 22:1 will continue to be notified as per TEC 25.113.

4. Teacher Certification

Exemption from: TEC 21.003; TEC 21.053; TEC 21.055; TEC 21.057

Relevant Board Policies: DBA Legal, DBA Local, DK Legal, DK Local

Manner in which statute inhibits the goals of the plan

TEC 21.003 states that a person may not be employed as a teacher, teacher intern or teacher trainee, librarian, educational aide, administrator, educational diagnostician, or school counselor by a school district unless the person holds an appropriate certificate or permit issued by the appropriate state agency.

In the event a district cannot locate a certified teacher for a position or a teacher is teaching a subject outside of their certification, the district must request emergency certification from the Texas Education Agency and/or State Board for Educator Certification. .

TEC 21.053 requires a teacher to present his or her certificate to the District before their employment contract will be binding, and prohibits the District from paying an educator for teaching if the educator does not hold a valid certificate at the time.

TEC 21.055 states that if a teacher is not certified, the District may issue a teaching permit to employ the individual. This process requires notice to the Commissioner and its usefulness is extremely limited.

TEC 21.057 requires that the District provide written notice to parents if an inappropriately certified or uncertified teacher is assigned to a classroom for more than 20 consecutive days.

Innovation Strategies

- a. The District will maintain its current expectations for employee certifications. This exemption will afford the district the flexibility to hire professionals in trade, vocational, and other hard to find positions, if certified teachers are not available or equipped to teach those courses.
- b. The district will allow certified secondary and elementary teachers to teach ONE subject out of their certified area for individuals who are knowledgeable in the area and equipped to effectively perform the duties of the position. The campus principal may submit to the Superintendent a request for local certification that will allow certified teachers to teach a course for which he/she is not certified. The principal must specify in writing the reason for this request and document the credentials or life experiences the teacher possesses that would qualify the individual to teach the proposed subject. Paperwork, will not be submitted to the Texas Education Agency, but will be filed locally. The district will ensure that all individuals have the knowledge and resources necessary to be successful.

- c. Instructional planning for the uncertified teacher's course will be created in partnership with certified teachers, Curriculum Coordinators or other qualified personnel. Uncertified teachers will be provided teacher mentoring, increased observations and feedback, professional development or instructional resources, or other supports.
- d. The superintendent will report this action to the Board of Trustees at the first Board meeting following the assignment.
- e. Teacher certification waiver requests, state permit applications, or other paperwork will not be submitted to the Texas Education Agency. The District will ensure that all individuals assigned to teach have the knowledge and resources necessary to be successful.
- f. Parents of students enrolled in a class where the teacher lacks appropriate certification will continue to be notified as per TEC 21.057.

5. <u>Designation of Campus Behavior Coordinator</u>

TEC 37.0012

Related Board Policies: FO Legal

Manner in which statute inhibits the goals of the plan:

TEC 37.0012 requires the designation (a) Campus Behavior Coordinator on each campus. This person is primarily responsible for maintaining student discipline and the implementation of Education Code – Chapter 37.

Innovation Strategies:

NISD strongly believes in safe schools with a collaborative approach to discipline, with multiple people providing emotional and social support to students, rather than just one person. Multiple campus administrators will serve as Campus Behavior Coordinators to better serve the individual campus needs.
